We held our Fall Dinner Meeting in November and I am still receiving compliments from members that attended. A big thank you to Curt Morris, our board member and former mayor, who delivered the program.



For those of you who might want to read the Stanley Plummer address from 1967 that Curt gave you can view it on our CatalogIt app. You will need to download the CatalogIt app to whichever device you will be using to view the files. It is compatible with PC, laptop, iPad and smartphones (iOS and Android). When you open the app, it will ask for email and password. Once you have the app all set up you can either browse through our collection or go straight to the Plummer address by searching object id H-016.4 or search by object name Stanley Plummer address.

With the help of our volunteer, Julia Bourbois and our new intern Darlene Jaber we are attempting to organize, scan and have more of our collection available to view on CatalogIt. We currently have over 30,000 photos (most of our photos have been digitized), 500 3D objects (80% are digitized and available to view), and 50 maps (some others are too large or too fragile to be scanned). We are currently working on adding written material that we have in our archives.

THIS DATE IN HISTORY: From the March 18, 1918 San Dimas Press Purchases Paint Mine In San Dimas Canyon

This city is to have a new enterprise in the way of a paint factory. W. L. Porterfield, president of "Pa's Metallic Paint company" of Los Angeles, has purchased the paint mine in San Dimas canyon and will start immediately about a dozen men to working the mine.

For several years it has been known that there were valuable deposits of paint clay in San Dimas canyon, but for various reasons it has not been worked. Mr. Porterfield is an experienced paint manufacturer and is much pleased with the quality of the clay in the canyon. While the starting of the factory will be modest, he intends to add to his force and the amount of production until the enterprise will assume considerable proportions.



As a resident of San Dimas for 16 years, I've come to appreciate the rich history that makes this city what it is today. From the buildings to the agriculture, there's so much to uncover about the early days of San Dimas. But what fascinates me most are the stories of everyday life and the fun anecdotes that don't always get talked about. Who better to learn from than former Mayor Curt Morris, a longtime resident with a wealth of knowledge about the city's past?

When I asked Curt about a typical Saturday in San Dimas during his younger years, I was amazed by the simplicity of how our town use to be.

"In high school, San Dimas was a small town," Curt shared with me. "Long before there was a San Dimas High School, I attended Bonita Union High School. The school district was small too— San Dimas, La Verne, and La Verne Heights all had their own districts, but shared the same High School. The entire school had only 450 students!" It wasn't just the schools that felt different. The way students got around was very different than the way students get around today.

"Getting to school, we mostly hitchhiked," Curt said. "And after school, we'd hitchhike home. That was just the way things were."

I couldn't help but feel a bit astonished at the idea of hitchhiking as a regular part of life. But Curt wasn't done yet. He had even more to share!

"One of the crazier things we used to do was go to the movies in Pomona," Curt recalled with a smile. "I was about 10, and I had a little sister named Sina, who was 6. We'd catch the bus from San Dimas to the Fox Theater in Pomona. It was mostly just a bunch of kids—no adults. We'd get the bus over at Monte Vista and the Water District, and it would be around 15-20 of us kids."

Can you imagine that? A group of kids, heading to another city to watch a movie without adult supervision. The bus ride was only five cents each way, and the trip was a regular Saturday outing.

"We did this almost every Saturday. We'd go to the Fox Theater or the State Theater, which was just up the street. The State showed westerns, and they always had these series, or 'cereals,' as we called them. They were short episodes that always ended with a cliffhanger, leaving us hanging until the next week to

find out what happened. The whole thing only cost 20 cents, and we'd be there for hours!"

The sense of community during these trips was something Curt fondly remembers. The kids were well-behaved, and everyone knew each other.



"Pomona was the

big city back then, with around 50-60,000 people," Curt explained. "But for us, it felt like a whole new world. San Dimas and La Verne didn't have many people at the time, so when we went to Pomona, it felt like a real adventure."

2024 Was A Great Year!

In 2024 total sales were \$10,790 with net income of \$10,211, what a great year! It was only possible by your continuing support.

In 2024 we did have the advantage of the Yard Sale in April, and the Christmas room in December with over \$2,600 earned in those two events. Unfortunately, there will not be a yard sale or an elaborate Christmas room this year. There are just not enough volunteers to make that happen. We will be entirely dependent on the sales in the gift shop. So please, if you have any "treasures" you don't want and your children don't want, they will be welcomed for the gift shop and treasured by their new owner. All proceeds continue to support our efforts to digitally preserve and catalog the history of San Dimas for future generations.
