THIS DATE IN HISTORY:

From the February 14, 1907 San Dimas Eagle Chemical Engine Arrives

The first of the week witnessed the arrival of the new chemical fire engine for our town. This event marks another step in the forward progress of this community and has been made possible in the liberality of our citizens.

The need of additional protection from fire has been felt here for a long time and the new apparatus, which is a forty gallon Stempel machine manufactured by the Robinson Fire Engine Works of St. Louis, MO, it is thought will insure this.

The cost of the machine is considerably over \$400, a goodly amount of which has been donated by the San Dimas Citrus Union and the San Dimas Lemon Association.

After a shelter has been furnished for the new machine, the next step to take will be the organization of a volunteer fire department.

CUPT'S COPNET By: Selina Garcia

Curt's military journey is one that began with a simple conversation and led to remarkable experiences across the globe.

Curt's story starts in high school with a pivotal interaction with one of his teachers. "I had a PE teacher who also taught history," Kurt recalls. "He was running a summer program for teachers, and he suggested I should go to Stanford University. I told him, 'No way. There's no way I can go to Stanford.' His name was Mr. Van Kinkle, and he said, 'Yes, you can.' He told me about a program called Navy Reserve Officer Training Corps (NROTC), which had two parts: regular and contract. After taking the test and passing, I was chosen for the program, and that was the start of my journey."

At the time, only 52 colleges in the U.S. offered the NROTC program, and Curt became one of the few to attend Stanford as part of it. He had no idea that his decision would lead him to not only graduate with a degree but also embark on summer cruises that would be full of unforgettable experiences.

During his time at Stanford, Curt didn't just focus on academics; he also dedicated time to naval science classes. The summers were even more thrilling, as he embarked on summer cruises that allowed him to travel across the Atlantic and beyond. One of his first cruises took him to Scotland, Denmark, and the Azores, offering him experiences that few could dream of. "We went from Norfolk, Virginia, all the way to Scotland. We stopped in the Azores, and our route took us around the Shetland Islands before docking in Edinburgh. We tied up at the Port of Leith, a small but picturesque location where we would cross tiny drawbridges".

The journey wasn't just about sightseeing. As part of the cruise, Curt was stationed on a destroyer and got a taste of naval life firsthand. "We went to places like Denmark and we encountered mine-sweeping operations in the waters. Occasionally, a loose mine would be spotted, and they would blow it up using rifles," Curt recalls. "One time, I witnessed a mine being detonated."

The summer cruises gave Curt the opportunity to visit many different countries, including Guantanamo Bay and Roose-



velt Roads, and experience various aspects of the military. The most thrilling part of his training came during his second summer when he spent three weeks at the Naval Station in Corpus Christi. There, he was introduced to naval aviation. "We were able to fly a T-33 fighter jet. It was incredible—two-seat planes, with the pilot giving us full freedom to explore the skies. We also got to fly a seaplane and fire rockets from it," Curt says.

After graduating from Stanford, Curt's naval career continued with another significant milestone: his time on the battleship *Wisconsin*. His service took him to various places, including Chile. "We went through the Panama Canal and docked in Valparaiso. It was a massive naval force, the biggest south of the equator at the time," Curt remembers. The fleet consisted of a battleship, three cruisers, several destroyers, and an aircraft carrier, and they were all working together to patrol the region.

Curt also shares an interesting tale of a fundraising event back home, where a community raised money for war bonds during World War II. He vividly remembers how "everyone was mobilized for the war effort," and how gasoline rations and other commodities were restricted. "It seemed like everyone, not just a select few, was affected by the war. Everyone knew what was going on, and you could see the impact on daily life."

Whether it's the thrill of flying a fighter jet or the time spent in foreign ports, Curt's journey is definitely a story worth telling. Thank you Curt for your service, as well as all the other men and women who have served in our military to keep our country safe.
